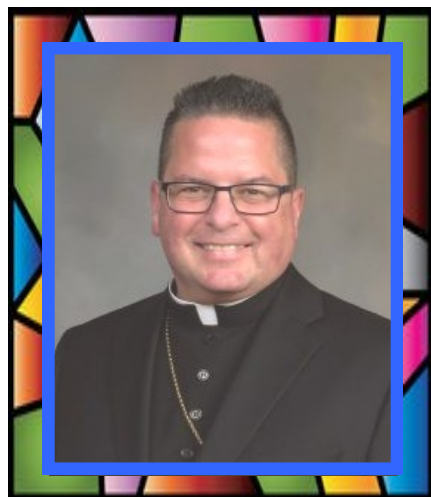

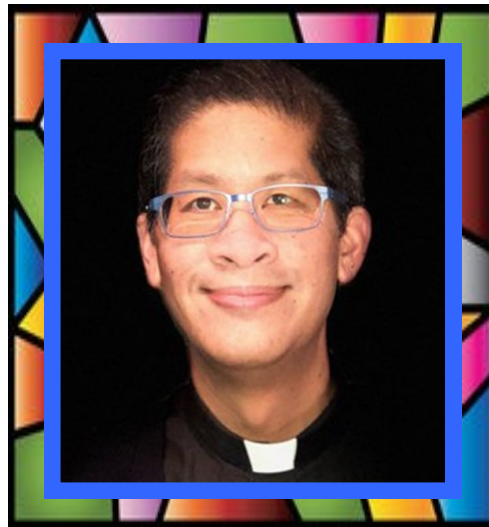

Keynote Address

The Eucharist and Synodality: Journeying Together as the Body of Christ

On Oct. 10, 2021, Pope Francis began a two year process that will culminate with a synod on synodality in 2023. During the opening Mass, he called the entire Church to “journey together” and to remain open to encountering Christ in one another through communion, participation, and mission. Synodality is not just about listening to the Holy Spirit and to one another; it is a new way of being Church. Join us as we mark this historical journey by renewing our understanding of the Eucharist as a model of synodality!



Rev. Ricky Manalo, CSP, Ph.D., is a Paulist priest, composer (OCP), theologian, and author. He is the 2020 Distinguished Catholic Music Composer of the Year Award by the Association of Pastoral Musicians. He studied composition and piano at the Manhattan School of Music, theology at the Washington Theological Union, and liturgy, culture, and sociology at the Graduate Theological Union (GTU), Berkeley, CA. His books include: *Chanting On Our Behalf* (2015, First Place Award, Catholic Press Association) and *The Liturgy of Life* (2014, finalist of the Excellence in Publishing Awards by the Association of Catholic Publishers). He is a theological consultant for the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops and the co-author of the official national pastoral plan for Asian Pacific Catholics, *Encountering Christ in Harmony* (USCCB, 2018). His latest book which he co-wrote with Simon Kim is *Intercultural Marriage: A Pastoral Guide to the Sacrament* (Paulist Press), 2021).
